A Royal Occasion



The Earl and Countess of Wessex paid a private visit to the thousand years old Milton Abbey on Friday, 2nd May. The visit was attended by the Lord Lieutenant, the Chairman and Chief Executive of North Dorset District Council and a small group of invited guests.

The visit started with a description by the eminent landscape historian, John Phibbs, pictured below, of the outstanding landscape park designed by Capability Brown, considered to be one of his best schemes in the whole country.



This was followed by an explanation of the history of the Abbey by the Archdeacon for Dorset, Stephen Waine. Milton

Abbey is steeped in history reaching back to the very beginnings of the English Kingdom. Founded by King Athelstan, the first King of All England, in 933, it was initially a monastery, until after the Reformation



it passed into private hands for 400 years. In the 18th century it became part of a grand scheme of Lord Milton, including a lavish Gothic mansion and the Capability Brown park. Since 1932 it has been owned by the Diocese of Salisbury.





Architect Marcus Chantrey described the programme of works planned for the building.
